



CONVENTION MINUTES

OPENING CEREMONY, FRIDAY, JUNE 21, 1996

The 64th Annual District Convention hosted by the Stockton AHEPA family at the Stockton Hilton Hotel, Stockton, California was called to order by Convention Chairman and Stockton Chapter #212 President Brother Tom Chiarchianis at 9:30 am on Friday, June 21, 1996. Brother Chiarchianis welcomed all the delegates and wished them success in their deliberations. Brother Chiarchianis turned the gavel over to District Governor George Booras.

The posting of the Colors was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. District Chaplain Brother John Koplos gave the opening prayer. All delegates then continued standing for a moment of silence for Departed Brothers. See Pages 22-24 for a list of deceased Brothers.

PDG Bill Rotas stated that this was the Fiftieth Anniversary of the first Post World War II District Convention. Fittingly, the convention was held fifty years ago at the Stockton Hotel. The 1946 Convention Chairman was Anthony Marmas.

With the Convention now open for business, Brother George Booras asked for nominations for convention chairman. PDG Ted Cuclis nominated Brother Bill Booras, Fresno Chapter 151, for Convention Chairman. Nominations were closed and an unanimous ballot was cast for Brother Bill Booras as Convention Chairman.

PDG Bill Rotas nominated PDG Mike Pappas, Stockton Chapter 212, for Convention Vice Chairman. Nominations were closed and an unanimous ballot was cast for PDG Mike Pappas as Convention Vice-Chairman.

Brother Harry Kalargiros nominated Brother Bill Christie, Garden City Chapter 251, for Convention Secretary. Nominations were closed and an unanimous ballot was cast for Brother Bill Christie as Convention Secretary.

PDG Gus Lekas administered the oath of office to the newly elected convention officers.

Convention Chairman Bill Booras thanked the delegates for electing him as Convention Chairman and made the following appointments: PDG Chris Rockas, Fresno Chapter #151 Parliamentarian; PDG Gus Lekas, Oakland Chapter #171, Marshall.

Brother John Guy, San Mateo County Chapter #393, requested through the grievance committee that he be accepted as a delegate representing his chapter. Convention Chairman Bill Booras

appointed a Grievance and Credentials Committee consisting of Brother Greg Scandalis (Chairman), George Johnson (Secretary) and Gus Hazifotis to consider Brother Guy's request. The Grievance Committee verified that the proper documentation was in order and registration fees were paid and moved that Brother Guy be accepted as a delegate. PDG John Koplos seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The voting strength for this meeting session after roll call was determined to be 38.

Chapter Reports (Note: Chapter reports are grouped together below and are not necessarily in the order given).

Golden Gate-Pacific #150 was given by PDG Paul Eliopoulos. 45 year Ahepan Peter Spyropoulos was elected Chapter Ahepan of the Year. For written report see page 25.

Fresno Chapter #151 was given by Brother Bill Booras. A few changes were made to written report. For written report see pages 26-28.

Sacramento Chapter #153 was given by PDG Bill Rotas. For written report see pages 29. Brother Rotas introduced Sacramento President-Elect Brother George Koufasimes. Brother Rotas reported a study (see page 30) made of the Delinquent Member Report submitted to the Chapter by the Supreme Lodge. Off the list, members who had not paid their dues in recent years were contacted, four of fourteen members contacted brought their dues current.

Oakland Chapter #171 was given by Past President Anastasious Piliotis. Changes made to written report. Recommended that all chapters seek younger candidates to the Order. For written report see page 31.

Stockton Chapter #212 was given by Brother Steve Panos. For written report see page 32.

Solano Chapter #217 was given by Brother Arnold Dorer. For written report see page 33.

Marysville Chapter #228 was given by Brother Harry Karmegas. For written report see page 34.

Modesto Chapter #246 was given by Brother Nick Korakas, Treasurer. Modesto Chapter donated \$5,000 to Annunciation Church in Modesto and will be given in three increments. Thanked the District for awarding student scholarships to all recipients including Ms Gianopoulos from Modesto. For written report see page 35.

Garden City Chapter #251 was given by Brother Gus Hazifotis. For written report see page 36.

Contra Costa County Chapter #259. No one representing Chapter #259 was present. For written report see page 37.

Reno Chapter #281 was given by Brother Alex Lemberes. For written report see page 38.

San Mateo County Chapter #392 was given by Brother Ilias Frangos. Brother Frangos reported that Chapter #392 has had the Greek Flag raised at City Hall for thirteen consecutive years commemorating March 25, Greek Independence Day, with local dignitaries in attendance. For written report see page 39.

District Lodge Reports (Note: District Lodge reports are grouped together and are not necessarily in the order given).

District Chaplain: PDG John Koplos, Oakland Chapter #171 reported. Written report on page 54.

District Warden: Brother Harry Haramalis, San Mateo County Chapter #392, reported. A new flag was purchased. PDG Mike Pappas asked "Where is the flag I purchased for the District?" Written report on page 53.

District Marshall: Brother Leo Malliarys, Oakland Chapter #171, reported. Written report on page 51 and 52.

District Secretary: Brother Steve Bolaris, Garden City Chapter #251, reported. Brother Bolaris reported that in the spirit of Hellenism his son signed up for Modern Greek at the University of Arizona. Written report on pages 47 and 48.

District Treasurer: Brother Alex Lemberes, Reno Chapter #281, reported. Check book balance as of June 22, 1996 of \$2,189.59. Written report page 39. Report accepted as presented. Auditors found all records and procedures in order. In the future, closing books will be on June 1st of each year. See finacial statements pages 49 and 50.

District Lt. Governor: Brother Charles Spyropoulos, Oakland Chapter #171, reported. Written report on page 46. Brother John Guy questioned why Contra Costa County Chapter #392 was not on the District Governor's Activity Summary (Page 45). Response was DG Booras had to miss this visitation.

District Governor: Brother George Booras, Oakland Chapter #171, reported. Written report and recommendations on pages 40-45. Brother Booras also suggested that in the interest in speeding up Convention business eliminate the reading of reports that are included in the Convention Agenda and verbal reports be limited to special and/or projects reports. Report was adopted.

Standing Committee/Special Reports (These reports are grouped together and are not necessarily in the order given).

Charitable Raffle: PDG Paul Eliopoulos reported that 662 raffle tickets have been sold and projects a total of 750 to be sold by drawing time Saturday, June 22. He also reported that the raffle has generated over \$300,000.00 profit over the eleven year period. Written reports on pages 55-58.

Past District Governor's Club: PDG Ted Cuclis reported that \$2,000.00 has been collected so far for the Gust Aretos Scholarship fund. With a \$5,000.00 donation to the District Scholarship Fund a perpetual scholarship will be established. PDG Dr. Karl Konstantin explained the Scholarship would be in name only in memory of Gust Aretos. PDG Bill Rotas explained how scholarship fund works - one fund, several accounts. Report on page 59.

District Scholarship Committee: Brother Harry Kalargrios, Garden City Chapter #251, reported. Written report on page 60-61. There was a lot of discussion concerning the Ahepa Scholarship program. Most of the discussion centered around the capability of giving additional scholarships, the growth of the Scholarship Fund, and what the Order receives in return, if anything from the scholarship recipients.

District Sons of Pericles Advisor Report: Convention Chairman Bill Booras read the Sons of Pericles report that was faxed to the convention by District Advisor to the Sons of Pericles George Douveas. Brother Douveas was unable to attend the convention because of his relocation to Southern California. Written report on page 62.

Ahepa Tribute Report: PDG Ted Cuclis reported. Brother Cuclis reported that since his written report submitted and included with the Convention Agenda he had traveled to the dedication ceremony in Atlanta, Georgia the weekend of June 1, 1996. PDG Cuclis commented that he was greeted very warmly and that District 21 did a great job supporting the project (\$11,321 with Daughters of Penelope contributing over half). There is still a short fall of funds to provide perpetual maintenance of the project. Those who have not yet contributed and want to should contact Brother Cuclis. He also stated the Tribute Sculpture was very impressive - more so than the literature shows. Written report on pages 63-65.

District Convention Guidelines: PDG Andrew Maris reported on a joint committee with the Daughters of Penelope on the changes to the District Convention Guideline Handbook. Ahepa committee members in addition to Brother Maris were PDG Angelo Mountanos and PDG Gus Lekas. Each paragraph and change was read and discussed on the floor. There was considerable discussion on the wording of many of the paragraphs. Major changes were the split of convention proceeds between Ahepa and the Daughters from 60/40 to 50/50 including the Fashion Show and Golf Tournament proceeds and the limit of \$10 for Convention Delegate registration fees. A written report or modified guideline copy was not available to include with these minutes. A revised copy will be made available to all Chapters at a latter date?

Following the reports, the Convention Chairman Bill Booras appointed the "Working Committees." He advised delegates they could select additional committees to serve on if they had an interest. Asked that reports be typewritten leaving one inch margins on each side.

Adjourned for Committee Meetings and Delegate Luncheon at 11:45. Meetings will resume at 2:00 pm.

Convention Meetings - Friday Afternoon Session - Called to order 2:05 pm.

Convention Chairman Bill Booras introduced Supreme Treasurer Dr. James Dimitriou. Dr. Dimitriou thank the District Members for their hospitality. He reviewed briefly the topics he will cover (Ahepa 2000, Hellenic Affairs, Supreme Convention, status of Supreme Headquarters) when he addresses the Convention Delegates at a later time.

Convention Chairman Bill Booras announced that PDG Nick Kapetan, Fresno Chapter #151, was appointed to fulfil the remaining term of the late Gust Aretos on the Board of Directors.

Convention Chairman Bill Booras reminded everyone to type their committee reports leaving a one inch margin on both sides of the paper. Typewriters are made available for this purpose.

PDG George Margelos, Chairman of the Convention Cities and Conference Committee, reminded the delegation that not one chapter has come forward to host either the 1997 Convention or the Fall and Spring Conferences. Brother Margelos asked that chapters step forward and offer to host the Convention or Conferences.

Brother Margelos also announced that there is a resolution pending establishing a Gust Aretos Scholarship Fund. Anyone wishing to contribute to this fund should do so at this convention.

This announcement was followed some discussion on considering having only one conference each year. This would be a single conference held during the winter months leaving the summer months open for the District Convention. The subject of a joint District Convention with District 20 and 21 was also brought up.

Supreme Treasurer Dr. James Dimitriou said he had been authorized to act as liaison and offer an invitation to District 21 to join Districts 20 and 22 at a Tri-District Convention to be held in Reno, Nevada. He also mentioned that District 26 (Canada) and District 19 showed some interest. The format would consist of each District having separate business meetings, all social functions would be combined. Costs, profit sharing, etc. considerations would be resolved through a joint committee. Brother Dimitriou said Joint District Conventions have been successful back East with a similar format.

Supreme Treasurer Dr. James Dimitriou Report: Dr. Dimitriou commended District Governor George Booras and the District in general on their excellent communication. The first topic Brother Dimitriou covered was the 22 recommendations of the Ahepa 2000 Committee. These preliminary recommendations were passed out to the delegates in attendance and a copy is included with these minutes on pages 86-87. Also, copies of the official draft (43 pages) were available but not included with these minutes. Suggested delegates review the official draft before going to the Supreme Convention in Houston. Ahepa 2000 is chaired by Bill Marianes of Atlanta and Brother Dimitriou is the Supreme Lodge liaison with the Ahepa 2000 Committee. Dr. Dimitriou reviewed and editorialized each of the 22 recommendations. Questions and comments followed from the floor concerning the recommendations.

Next, Brother Dimitriou announced that Nick Garnett has been appointed Executive Secretary. He is 38 year old Greek-American. Also, Controller Aggie Capsalis has given his resignation, a replacement has not yet been found.

Brother Dimitriou stated that headquarters has been forging ahead and has had a successful year in Congress with Hellenic affairs and issues. Many other topics were brought up concerning Greece and Turkey.

Brother Dimitriou thanked everyone for allowing him to speak and answered questions from the floor, primarily concerning the status of the problems at Headquarters in Washington, D.C. Litigation costs are draining Ahepa. In order to continue litigation a one time \$12 assessment for each member is being considered and will be brought up at the Supreme Convention in Houston. A proposed National Ahepa Budget to be discussed at the Houston Convention is on pages 88 and 89.

Convention Chairman Brother Bill Booras thanked Supreme Treasurer James Dimitriou for his comments.

Brother Booras reminded all delegates to have their committee reports ready for the morning business meeting session and to be on time. Those committees who still have business to conduct can now meet.

The Friday afternoon meeting session was adjourned at 4:30 pm. Meetings to resume Saturday, June 22, 1996 at 9:00 am.

SATURDAY, JUNE 22, 1996, MEETING CALLED TO ORDER AT 9:15 AM.

Working Committee Reports (These reports are not necessarily listed in the same order as given).

Grievance Committee: Other than recommending approval of Brother John Guy as a delegate there was no further report.

Scholarship Committee: Chairman PDG Dr. Karl Konstantin and PDG Bill Rotas reporting. Discussion concerning how many years the same chairman of the Scholarship Committee can serve. The 63rd Convention voted to limit the chairmanship to 2 years. The matter was brought to a vote again. In favor of eliminating two year term for Scholarship Chairman. Yea 13 votes Nay 15 votes. Motion was defeated. A motion to invest up to 25% of scholarship funds and not to exceed \$50,000 into low risk investments in order to improve rate of return was approved. A memo written by the Daughters concerning the plans for the Scholarship event held March 1996 was read to the delegation. No action was taken on this matter, a motion to table the discussion was approved. Written report on pages 66-70.

Convention-Conference Cities: Chairman PDG George Margelos reporting. Committee voted down the Tri-District Convention format. As of the conclusion of the District Convention no chapter agreed to host the 65th Annual District Convention or the Fall Conferences. Garden City Chapter #251 offered to take the 1997 Spring Conference. Motion carried to accept report. Written report on page 71.

Sons of Pericles: Brother Anastasios Konstantin reporting. Recommend that Sons and Maids be invited to participate in plans for District Conventions. Asked each Chapter to generate a list of 14 - 18 year old youths as potential members. Also, to earmark potential leaders. Brother Konstantin asked that the Sons be budgeted for \$500.00. PDG Bill Rotas asked for explanation of expenses. Brother Konstantin explained that since 1991 the Sons expenses have been picked up by the Oakland Chapter. PDG Dr. Karl Konstantin moved to allocate \$500.00, seconded by Brother Harry Harmallis - motion carried.

Growth & Expansion: Chairman Ilias Frangos, San Mateo County Chapter #392 reporting. Written report on page 72. Report approved as read.

Traveler Committee: Chairman Lt. Governor Charles Spyropoulos reporting. Written report and recommendations on page 73. All chapters are encouraged to submit their mailing list or membership roster at least once a year to keep the Traveler mailing list up to date. Also, send corrections, additions and deletions throughout the year. Report approved as read.

Daughters Liaison: Chairman DG George Booras reporting. Written report with items discussed and approved by Ahepa and the Daughters on page 74. Report approved as read.

Athletic Committee: Chairman Steve Mouvardas reporting. Written report with recommendations are on page 76. Report approved as read.

Ahepan, Chapter and President of the Year: Chairman DG George Booras reporting. Ahepan of the Year - John T. Koplos, Oakland Chapter #171. There were three applications this year. PDG John Koplos is always there when called upon. Chapter of the Year - Oakland Chapter #171. The Oakland Chapter had outstanding attendance and signed many new members. President of the Year - Tom Chiarchianis, Stockton Chapter #212. Brother Tom has provided great leadership and enthusiasm over the past year. Written report on page 77.

Special Projects: Chairman James Nicolaou, Fresno Chapter #151, reporting. Written report on pages 78-79. Report approved as read. At this time Brother Nicolaou, through Fresno Chapter #151, presented icons from the Nuns from the Convent of the Theotokos at St. Nicholas Ranch to the following chapters who contributed to their cause: Golden Gate Chapter #150, Fresno Chapter #151, Garden City Chapter #251 and San Mateo County Chapter #392.

Board of Advisors/Directors: No appointed committee.

By-Laws, Rules & Regulations: No appointed committee.

Legislative Banquet: No appointed committee.

Combined Audit and Budget Committee: Reported by Brother Arnold Dorer. All records were found in order and balances in agreement. Committee recommends to close books as of June 1 each year. Written report on page 80. The 1996 - 1997 budget was brought to the floor by Finance Chairman PDG Bill Rotas. Discussion on the floor on each line item - trimming expenses resulted in a balanced budget. The 1996-1997 budget was approved as revised. Copy of budget as revised on pages 81-82.

Resolutions Committee: Chairman PSS Andrew T. Banis reporting. Written report of 5 resolutions submitted on pages 83-85. Resolution #5 establishes the Gust Aretos Scholarship Fund with guidelines. This resolution was discussed with the Daughters since it affects their share of the Raffle proceeds - the Daughters concurred with the resolution. Resolutions approved as amended. PSS Banis showed concern that District 20 was scheduling their Convention for 1997 in our territory, Reno, Nevada.

Legislation Committee: Chairman Brother Anastasios Piliotis, Oakland Chapter #171, reporting. Brother Samouris introduced newly elected Oakland Chapter President Samouris. He thanked the District Lodge for selecting the Oakland Chapter as Chapter of the Year. Commended District Governor Booras for giving a very comprehensive report. The committee supported the District Governor's report but did not spend much time on the report because of the overlap with other committees, but agreed with his recommendations. Brother Piliotis reviewed all the recommendations, see District Governor's Report. The only other recommendation made was one regarding the United Hellenic Organizations of Northern California. The recommendation is to do nothing this year and until tax exempt status is resolved. Report was adopted as given. A written report was not submitted.

Morning session adjourned at 10:45 am. Afternoon session to begin with roll call at 1:30 pm.

Afternoon session called to order at 1:35 pm by Convention Chairman Bill Booras.

District Governor George Booras reported that a few copies of the Ahepa 2000 preliminary report and proposed National Budget were available for delegates planning to attend the Supreme Convention.

District Governor Booras reported that all Convention Guidelines changes discussed on the floor Friday were approved by the Daughters. The Gust Aretos Scholarship Fund, \$500 sponsorship of the Modern Greek Studies, Raffle Early Bird Drawing increase to four prizes at \$500 each, replace Fall Conference to Workshop, continue Fresno Chapter to solicit voluntary donations for the nuns at St. Nicholas Ranch were also approved by the Daughters.

Motion to reconsider the concept of a Tri-District Convention in Reno, Nevada with Districts 20 and 22 was brought to floor by PDG John Koplos and seconded by Brother Nick Karakas. After a discussion the motion was voted on by a show of hands. Yea 12 votes Nay 15 votes. Motion was defeated.

District Governor George Booras made a motion to reconsider his recommendation to form a combined Scholarship Foundation. The motion was seconded by PDG Bill Rotas. After a short discussion on forming a joint Ahepa and Daughters Foundation composed of three Ahepans and three Daughters a motion was made by District Governor George Booras to establish a "Combined Foundation." Motion was seconded by Brother Chris Rockas. Motion carried.

Good of the Order

Brother George Johnson thanked PDG Bill Rotas for making the scholarship brochure used at the banquet. The brochure was informative and expedited the banquet proceedings resulting in an enjoyable evening. The Daughters did not want to have a brochure for their recipients.

It was suggested that the Scholarship Committee inform the Convention Banquet Committee at least a week in advance how many students and their parents will attend the banquet so they have an accurate count. Committee lucked out, they guessed 130 guests, 133 attended the banquet.

Brother John Guy offered a sure-fire way to quit smoking. Solution - one half teaspoon of cream of tartar in a glass of orange juice each day for month.

Brother James Nicolaou, Fresno Chapter #151 shared a photograph of the Fresno Chapter's Centennial Brick.

\$51 was collected from late arrivals to the afternoon and morning sessions. Money was turned over to the scholarship committee.

ELECTION OF DISTRICT LODGE OFFICERS

Appointment of Tellers: Convention Chairman Brother Bill Booras appointed John Guy, San Mateo County Chapter #392; Tassos Samouris, Oakland Chapter #171; Jim Koplos, Oakland Chapter #171; Nick Karakas, Modesto Chapter #246.

Election of District Governor: Lt. Governor Charles Spyropoulos nominated District Governor George Booras for re-election. Brother George declined. District Governor George Booras nominated Lt. Governor Charles Spyropoulos, Oakland Chapter #171. The nomination was seconded by Brother George Konstantopoulos. Since there were no other nominations PDG Bill Rotas called to wave the rules and asked for a unanimous ballot be cast. Motion carried.

Election of District Lt. Governor: Brother Gus Hazifotis, Garden City Chapter #251, nominated District Secretary Steve Bolaris, Garden City Chapter #251. Nomination was seconded by Harry Harmalis, San Mateo County Chapter #392. A unanimous ballot was cast for Brother Steve Bolaris as District Lt. Governor.

Election of District Secretary: Brother Anastasios Samouris nominated Brother Leo Malliarys for the office of District Secretary. Brother Ted Giouzelis seconded the motion. Brother Charles Spyropoulos nominated Brother Gus Hazifotis. Brother Bill Christie seconded the motion. Brother Gus Hazifotis, Garden City Chapter 251, was elected District Secretary by 31 votes to 19 votes for Brother Malliarys.

Election of District Treasurer: PDG Bill Rotas nominated Brother Alex Lemberes for re-election to office of District Treasurer. The nomination was seconded by Brother George Johnson. A unanimous ballot was cast for Brother Alex Lemberes for the office of District Treasurer.

Election of District Marshall: Brother Lambros Panayotopoulos nominated Brother Anastasios Piliotis to the office of District Marshall. Nomination was seconded by Brother George Johnson. PDG George Marmas nominated Brother Tom Chiarchianis to the office of District Marshall. The nomination was seconded by Brother Harry Haramalis. Brother Tom Chiarchianis, Stockton Chapter #212, was elected by 37 votes to 12 votes for Brother Piliotis.

Election of District Warden: PDG Anthony Maris nominated Brother Anastasios Piliotis to the office of District Warden. The nomination was seconded by Brother Anastasios Konstantin. Brother Charles Spyropoulos nominated Brother Harry Haramalis to the office of District Warden. The nomination was seconded by Brother George Johnson. Brother Haramalis declined the nomination. A unanimous ballot was cast for Brother Piliotis for the office of District Warden.

Election of District Athletic Director: PDG George Konstantopoulos nominated Anastasios Konstantin to the office of District Athletic Director. The nomination was seconded by Brother Steve Panos. A unanimous ballot was cast for Brother Konstantin for the office of District Athletic Director.

District Governor's Report 64th Annual District Convention Stockton, California June 21, 1996

Mr. Chairman, Past Supreme Lodge Officers, Past District Governors, Members of the District Lodge, Chapter Officers and Delegates:

It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve as your District Governor during this past year. I would like to thank the delegates of the 63rd Annual District Convention in Sunnyvale for electing me to this office. I have had the opportunity to meet many new friends and renew acquaintances with many Brother Ahepans as I have traveled throughout the District. I wish to thank the officers and members of all of the chapters I have visited for their hospitality and friendship.

I would like to reflect briefly on what has transpired within Golden Gate District No. 21 during this past year. A summary of my activities as District Governor is included as an attachment to this report.

Unfortunately, the year began and ended with the passing of two dearly loved Brother Ahepans, both from the Garden City Ahepa Chapter. Our District Chaplain, Nicholas Smith, passed away in September, and we lost our Chairman of the Ahepa Board of Directors, Gust Aretos, in April. As all of you know, Brother Gus played a key role in gaining much deserved national recognition for District 21 as one of the most progressive and innovative districts in the Ahepa Domain.

One of the highlights of the year was the Scholarship Fund-Raiser, "An Evening of Visual Art", which was held in conjunction with the Spring Conference in Oakland. This was a different type of event for our district and it turned out to be an overwhelming success! We were pleased to have Supreme Vice President Steve Manta and Supreme Treasurer Jim Dimitriou in attendance. Everyone enjoyed a relaxed evening of visiting with old friends and making new acquaintances, while having the opportunity to view and purchase some wonderful works of art produced by Hellenic artists. Supreme Vice President Steve Manta commented that, "This type of event is what the Order of Ahepa is all about." Congratulations to the Scholarship Committees for a job well done!

I had the honor of representing the District 21 Order of Ahepa during the recent visit to the Bay Area of the President of Greece, his Excellency Constantinos Stephanopoulos. On Saturday, May 11th, I attended a reception

and dinner hosted by Alex Spanos at the St. Francis Hotel in San Francisco. On Sunday, May 12th, I attended the Hierarchal Divine Liturgy and reception for the President of Greece at the Ascension Greek Orthodox Cathedral in Oakland.

Order of AHEPA Supreme President Spiro Macris visited District 21 on Saturday, May 18th. He had an opportunity to briefly tour Oakland's Festival of Greece before going to the San Ramon Marriott Hotel for a dinner meeting with District 21 Ahepans. We all enjoyed his open discussion of issues affecting the future of the Order of Ahepa and his very frank response to the many questions that were raised.

District 21's response to the AHEPA Centennial Foundation's TRIBUTE Sculpture project was outstanding. Most chapters participated in the Commemorative Brick program. I would like to thank our District TRIBUTE Chairman, Brother Ted Cuclis, for his efforts in helping our District raise over \$11,000 for this very worthwhile project.

This year I reinstated the monthly District Governor's Bulletin. Effective and timely communication is a key element in the successful operation of the Order of Ahepa. I would like to see the monthly District Governor's Bulletin continued and would also like to encourage Chapters to submit announcements or flyers of upcoming events to the District Governor for inclusion in the District Governor's mailing.

Throughout the year a number of issues have arisen that need to be discussed and acted upon at this District Convention. These issues, along with my recommendations, are summarized in the following paragraphs:

Direct Billing. Headquarters has been testing a new direct billing system in District 12 with very positive results. A complete report was made at the Fall Conference in Fresno. District 21 has been invited to participate as the next trial District as the program is expanded. As on of the more progressive Districts, I would like to see District 21 take a lead role in helping develop and demonstrate this direct billing system. Eventually direct billing will be adopted by Ahepa on a National level, as it has been by numerous other professional and fraternal organizations. We have an opportunity, as one of the trial districts, to ensure that the program meets the needs of our District and our Chapters.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Authorize the District Governor to work with Headquarters to enroll District 21 in the Direct Billing Trial Program.

Modern Greek Studies Program. Two years ago the District 21 Order of Ahepa and Daughters of Penelope donated \$4,000 to the Modern Greek Studies Foundation which was used to sponsor a course in Modern Greek History at San Francisco State University's Center for Modern Greek Studies. The Center for

Modern Greek Studies offers a unique opportunity to educate the community about Greek History and the Hellenic ideals we all cherish. However, education requires a substantial ongoing financial commitment. It cannot succeed based on a one-time expenditure. The Modern Greek Studies Foundation has instituted a new program titled "Friends of the Center for Modern Greek Studies." The objective of this program is to encourage annual donations from individuals and organizations. There are several categories of annual giving ranging from "Friends" (less than \$100) to "Great Benefactors" (\$10,000 or more). For an annual donation of \$500 the Order of Ahepa can become a "Sponsor."

As additional background information, I received a copy of a May 13th letter from Dr. Peter Haikalis, Vice President of the Modern Greek Studies Foundation, to Milton Gust, President of the Ahepa Educational Foundation. The letter was a follow-up to a November 4, 1995 letter from Connie Aretos, Secretary of the Modern Greek Studies Foundation, seeking financial support for underwriting a course in Modern Greek Studies on an annual or biannual basis. The current cost of underwriting such a course is \$5,000, each time offered. Dr. Haikalis suggested that one way of memorializing the late Gust Aretos may be through the establishment of a course named in his honor. I discussed these letters with Supreme President Spiro Macris during his recent visit to District 21. He thought that this was a very good idea and will be proposing that the Ahepa Educational Foundation underwrite such a course in the name of Gust Aretos for a period of up to four or five years.

Recommendations: Include an Operating Budget line item for the expenditure of \$500 per year for the next four years to allow the District 21 Order of Ahepa to become a Sponsor of the Center for Modern Greek Studies. Solicit a matching donation of \$500 per year for the next four years from the Daughters of Penelope which would allow the District 21 Ahepa Family to become a Patron of the Center for Modern Greek Studies.

Finally, District 21 should pass a resolution encouraging the Ahepa Educational Foundation to sponsor an annual or biannual Modern Greek Studies course in the name of our dearly departed Brother, Gust Aretos.

Fall and Spring Conferences. The present District 21 format of Fall and Spring Conferences needs to be updated. It is difficult for many members to attend both the Fall and Spring Conferences and it is becoming more difficult to find host Chapters. Many Districts only hold a Mid-Winter Conference. I propose that we eliminate the Fall Conference. In its place the District Lodge could sponsor a Chapter Officers Workshop. The workshop could be held on a Sunday afternoon with the primary purpose of instructing Chapter Presidents and Secretaries regarding organizational, per-capita, and reporting requirements and deadlines. The Charitable Raffle tickets and District Convention minutes would also be distributed at this workshop. The cost of providing a light lunch could be covered by the District Lodge.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Replace the Fall Conference with a District Lodge sponsored Chapter Officers Workshop. Include an Operating Budget line item for the expenditure of \$300 to cover the cost of lunch for the Chapter Presidents and Secretaries. Move the Spring Conference to become a Mid-Winter Conference to be held prior to beginning of Lent.

Aretos Scholarship Fund. I commend the Past District Governors, under the leadership of Brother Nick Kapetan, for initiating the Aretos Scholarship Fund in our District. Brother Gust Aretos was truly an inspiration for all of us and is certainly deserving of this honor. As many of you know, Brother Aretos was instrumental in starting the District 21 Charitable Raffle Program which has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for charities in our District. I would like to see a portion of the Charitable Raffle proceeds be used to help fund the Aretos Scholarship. You should also know that, on a National level, the Ahepa Educational Foundation has established the Gust M. Aretos Student Intern Scholarship Fund in his memory.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Authorize the transfer of up to 5% of the net Charitable Raffle proceeds to the District 21 Aretos Scholarship Fund for the next two years.

Federation of Hellenic American Organizations of Northern California. A new, non-profit association of Hellenic American Organizations is in the process of being formed. This organization will be known as the "Federation of Hellenic American Organizations of Northern California." This new organization is intended as a replacement for the United Hellenic Societies of Northern California. The primary reason for the formation of this new organization is apparently for tax purposes. The purpose and objectives of this new organization are very similar to those of the Order of Ahepa and include:

- 1. To encourage and sponsor cultural and educational activities for the Hellenic American communities in Northern California.
- 2. To promote a better understanding between the American and Greek peoples and propagate the ideals of Hellenism in the United States of America.
- 3. To encourage the member organizations to participate in civic and ethnic activities held in Northern California.
- 4. To promote and encourage among the member organizations, loyalty and allegiance to the United States of America and its Constitution, as well as respect and obedience to the laws of its States and their subdivisions.

In addition, the organization seeks to coordinate the activities of all Hellenic American fraternal, benevolent, charitable, educational and professional organizations in Northern California whenever such activities pertain to issues of importance to the Greek American community relating to matters of Hellenic culture and heritage. Membership in the organization will be open to any

Hellenic American fraternal, benevolent, charitable, educational and professional organization located in Northern California, which complies with the application requirements. Annual membership dues are anticipated to be \$50.

Recommendations: Since the District Lodge represents all Ahepa Chapters in Northern California, I propose that the District apply for membership in the Federation of Hellenic American Organizations of Northern California on behalf of all Northern California Order of Ahepa Chapters and that the District Governor be the designated Order of Ahepa representative at all Federation meetings and functions. Include an Operating Budget line item for the expenditure of \$50 to cover the cost of the District membership application. I further recommend that individual District 21 Ahepa Chapters not be allowed to separately join the Federation. In this way we can present a united Order of Ahepa organization to the Federation.

<u>District 21 Athletic Program.</u> The District 21 Athletic Program has been inactive for the past several years. Golf tournaments and other athletic events have not been well received by the Ahepa membership. However, we are very fortunate to have a number of outstanding young adult, college-age, and adult athletes of Hellenic descent in our District. One way to revitalize interest in our District 21 Athletic Program is to sponsor an Athletic Awards Dinner honoring our outstanding male and female athletes in various age categories. Proceeds from the Athletic Awards Dinner could be used to sponsor Little League Baseball teams, purchase uniforms for basketball teams, etc.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Authorize the District Athletic Director to form a committee to investigate sponsoring a District 21 Athletic Awards Dinner.

As I travel throughout the District, I am encouraged by the increasing numbers of new, young members that are taking an active role in the operation and leadership of many of our chapters. I wish them continued success and would like to see some of these members also participate on the District Lodge. I would particularly like to congratulate Brother Tom Chiarchianis for his outstanding contributions this year as President of the Stockton Ahepa Chapter and as the Stockton Ahepa Family's Convention Chairman.

Finally, I would like to thank the entire Stockton Ahepa Family for the superb work they have done in organizing this year's District Convention.

District Marshal's Annual Report

Order of Ahepa - 1996

First I would like to thank my brother Ahepans for having given me the opportunity of serving them as their District Marshal during the past year. It has been a busy, exciting and informative year.

Early this year I was present at a meeting during which Bill Marianes, Chairman of Ahepa 2000, made a presentation regarding the Olympic Monument to the district officers. Besides myself, the list of district officers attending included George Booras and Steve Bolaris. Bill Marianes is a young attorney from Atlanta, Georgia. I am certain that his name will become familiar to all of you in the future. He is an outstanding young Ahepan.

One of the principle activities of the district officers is to visit the various lodges in the 21st District. These visitations provide the District with an opportunity to observe the local chapters and providing a means of passing along important information. This past year we also attended the funeral services for Brother Nick Smith, our deceased District Chaplain and the services for our beloved Supreme Lodge Brother Gus Aretos. We will never forget these fine men.

One of the greatest pleasures I have enjoyed as an Ahepan was that of escorting our Supreme President Dr. Spiro Macris during his recent visit to Oakland. We had very little notice that he would be coming. Together with Past District Governors Andy Banis and George Konstantopoulos I had the pleasure of showing Dr. Macris around at the Greek Orthodox Cathedral Food Festival at Oakland. He had an opportunity to meet many of our brother Ahepans. It was an absolutely gorgeous day. He appeared to be greatly pleased by the reception which he was given. Dr. Macris was also very impressed with the church facilities and the food festival. He was especially pleased to see that the Oakland Sons of Pericles and the Maids of Athens had a booth at the festival.

Latter a group of Ahepans from many parts of the state gathered at the Marriot Hotel in San Ramon for a small banquet in his honor at which he gave an extremely informative report on the status of Ahepa in the United States and many other issues effecting Hellenism at a national and international level. Our Supreme President is very knowledgeable and expresses himself in a clear well organized manner. He is a great credit to the Order.

I would like to pass long some of my personal impressions of the order. As time goes on we see the role of Ahepa changing. In it's

early days Ahepa's principle goal was to help Hellene immigrants in achieving a part of the American dream. Today Greek-Americans are the very best educated section of U.S. citizens on a per capita basis and economically, we are very close to the top. Considering that most of the Hellenes have been here less than 100 years, this is truly a remarkable achievement. Ahepa has played a significant role in the Greek-American success story. The founders of Ahepa and its early members have done an absolutely superb job! Each of you shares in the credit for this tremendous achievement.

Today, many Ahepans are 2nd, 3rd and even 4th generation Greek-Americans. We see about us brothers who are not of Hellenic ancestry. Many of these are some of our most dynamic members. Many of our members do not speak Greek, the language of Hellenism. It looks like Ahepa is changing and we must be ready for the changes. This is the task of AHEPA 2000. It is a great challenge. Obviously, Ahepa means many different things to different people. Ahepa has served many different purposes but our principle goal has always been to preserve and promote Hellenism. Our challenge today is to develop a means to continue the cause of Hellenism despite the fact that in future years very few of our members will be able to speak the Greek language. This is not an insurmountable problem.

The future depends on our identifying those types of activities which work effectively. It is essential that we create new programs which will attract a new generation of Ahepans. It is easy for us to forget that we are an ethnic organization. It doesn't take a rocket scientist mentality to tell us that we are not just another service organization. We are without doubt first and foremost an ethnic brotherhood.

It is perhaps the task for Ahepa to show the way to other Hellenic-American organizations to become more effective. It may be necessary for us to show that Hellenic-American organizations must work together in close cooperation if they are to survive and prosper. There will probably be fewer organizations in the future and these organizations will probably consist of fewer members, but they will be very, very effective groups. They will continue to represent the Hellenic agenda in the United States by nurturing an awareness of our ethnic roots. Hellenism, which invented democracy, has been around for over 2500 years and it will continue to be a part of the American portrait for a very long time to come.

DISTRICT 21 SONS OF PERICLES REPORT GEORGE DOUVEAS, ADVISOR

E. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE AHEPA FAMILY

There are inherent risks in stating merely summary conclusions and recommendations without outlining the substantial analysis or alternative points of view which were considered. Accordingly, the AHEPA 2000 Committee feels it is critical that one read this complete White Paper before reacting to any of the following specific conclusions.

Nevertheless, after extensive research and a deeply introspective and consensus-built process, the AHEPA 2000 Committee is making many, very specific recommendations to improve the AHEPA Family for the future. The following represents a partial listing of some of our most significant recommendations:

1. All organizations within the new AHEPA Family must adopt a unified mission statement which focuses on the Hellenic ideals of education, philanthropy, family and individual excellence.

CIVIL RESEAUCIBILITIES

2. In the future, it is likely that the AHEPA and Daughters of Penelope ("Daughters") will merge in order to survive and thrive. Until then, both separate organizations must reorganize around the new mission statement and work together as much as possible in order to achieve common goals, while at the same time, preserving some independence to pursue differing activities.

- 3. To survive and expand, the Sons and Maids should immediately merge and form the "American Hellenic Youth Organization," which focuses on programs and activities for young adults aged 14 through 22 which are unique from activities of the Church and other organizations.
- 4. The AHEPA, Daughters and American Hellenic Youth Organization should reorganize their national, regional and local officers and programs around the mission critical functions of Hellenism, education, philanthropy, family and individual excellence.
- 5. A President Elect should be elected each year in the AHEPA, Daughters, and American Hellenic Youth Organization who automatically ascends to the Presidency in the following year.
- 6. The 25 Districts should be replaced by 9 Regions covering the United States and Canada, based on demographic and geographic criteria.
- 7. The AHEPA Board of Directors ("Board") should be expanded to include a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer (the 2 positions alternate annually between the AHEPA and Daughters). The Assistant Treasurer should be elected through a national Chapter referendum process each year and automatically ascends to the position of Treasurer in the following year. Minimum credentials must be created for the Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer to better ensure they are qualified to perform their jobs.
- 8. The National Officers should be given the full power and authority to run all mission critical and fraternal activities of the AHEPA Family, while the Board should be charged with focusing solely on business and operational issues.
- 9. The members of the Board should: (a) be elected through a national Chapter referendum process; (b) be relatively equally divided

between the AHEPA and Daughters; (c) include the AHEPA and Daughters National Presidents; and (d) also include 1 representative from each of the 9 new Regions.

- 10. The National Office should be reorganized and moved to a less expensive and more accessible location, and an outsourced part-time Washington, D.C. legislative representative should be subcontracted.
- 11. Regional Offices should be established with Regional Representatives hired to facilitate, support and encourage local Chapter and Regional initiatives, public relations and mission-critical program expansion.
- 12. As many non-core, non-mission critical functions of the AHEPA Family as possible should be outsourced and performed by subcontractors.
- 13. The AHEPA Family must focus on substantially expanding its communications through the use of 21st century tools.
- 14. Unnecessary, archaic and inhibiting or embarrassing titles, rituals, secrecy and positions should be eliminated.
- 15. Chapter meetings must be refocused, streamlined and made more enjoyable and meaningful.
- 16. It is critical to ensure that members are getting something valuable out of their membership in the AHEPA Family.
- 17. Membership criteria should be unified, simplified and focused on a commitment to our core mission.
- 18. The AHEPA political parties and politics in general should be completely eliminated, and a meritocracy introduced in their place.
- 19. The National Conventions should be completely restructured to: (a) separate the abbreviated business portion from the social portion; (b) move through the real business in an organized manner and on a rapid basis; (c) provide trade show and business networking opportunities; (d) offer valuable assistance and educational programs to the members; (e) enhance participation by youth, families, members at large; and (f) increase and diversify social interaction opportunities.
- 20. Business, educational and professional networking, and social interaction, opportunities should be created and facilitated.
- 21. The AHEPA Family, and its various National, Regional and Chapter offices and officers must focus on providing member services and mission critical activities.
- 22. An AHEPA Family National Charitable Corporation (501(c)(3)) should be created and all of the various affiliated corporations and organizations at the national level which can be legally combined should be merged into it, with separate funds or foundations created to pursue the multiple mission critical philanthropic endeavors all under one umbrella organization.
