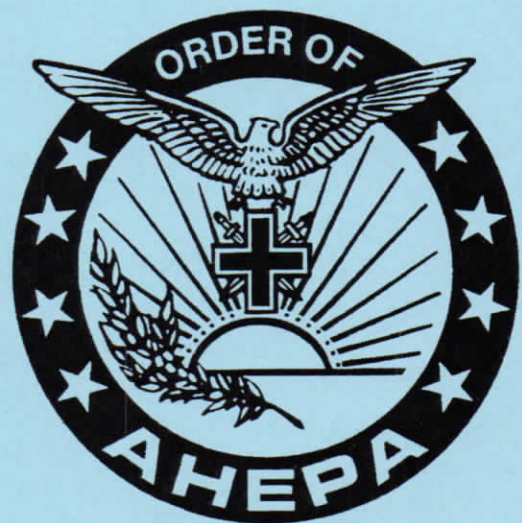

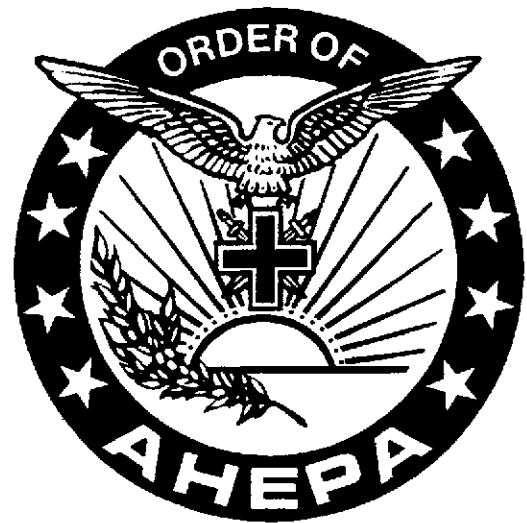

BUSINESS SESSION - FRIDAY MORNING, JUNE 9, 2000

Prior to the official opening of the Convention Nick Pedaris (District #20) Co- Chairman of the Ahepa Rose Bowl Parade Float gave a presentation on the project. The parade takes place on New Year's Day 2001. A brochure is included in the Convention Minutes on pages 29 and 30.

Convention was called to order by District #21 Governor Bill Booras at 9:40 a.m. Brother Booras welcomed the delegates to the convention and offered to assist them to insure they have an enjoyable and productive convention. Convention Chairman Chris Rockas could not attend the proceedings.

District Governor Bill Booras appointed Lambros Panayotopoulos, Garden City Chapter #251 and Bud Taylor, Fresno Chapter #151 to the Credentials Committee.

District Governor Bill Booras called roll of delegates. See Convention Agenda pages 10-17. Voting strength for the morning session and confirmed by the Credentials Committee at 29.

Convention Chairman PDG Michael Pappas dedicated the Convention to the late PDG Nick Kapetan who was a member of the host Fresno Chapter #151 and to all the departed brothers. See Memorial pages 18 and 19 in the Convention Agenda.

Chapter Reports: (10:10 a.m.) The next item of business was the Chapter Reports. In order to save time, Chapter delegates were asked not to read reports included in the Convention Agenda and only report on additional new or information not included in their written reports. The written reports are on pages 20-31 of the Convention Agenda. Additions were as follows:

Golden Gate Pacific Chapter #150. PSG Paul Eliopoulos reported that the Chapter held a Salmon Dinner not reported on the Chapter report and an additional member passed away for a loss of nine members over the past year.

Fresno Chapter #151. DG Bill Booras reported no changes.

Oakland Chapter #171. Brother Nick Gianopoulos reported no changes.

Sacramento Chapter #173. PDG Bill Rotas reported that the Chapter will award medals to members who are veterans. The medals given out at the Veterans Tribute held in Washington, D.C. are available for \$25 each. Also, Chapter is looking better with more participation. Chapter raised flag marking Greek Independence Day.

Stockton Chapter #212. No report was submitted.

Solano Chapter #217. Brother Arnold Doer reported no changes.

Marysville Chapter #228. Reported that the Chapter will be active in the Annual Marysville Peach Festival.

Modesto Chapter #246. Brother Byron Gravis reported that the Chapter is establishing a Seminary Endowment Fund. Students attending the Seminary from District #21 will be eligible to apply for a scholarship. Also, co-hosted Annual Ahepa Day with the Daughters.

Garden City Chapter #251. Yours truly Bill Christie reported that the Chapter co-hosted Daughters of Penelope Grand President Connie Aretos' Testimonial Dinner with Daphne Chapter #29 of San Jose held on May 21, 2000 at the Santa Clara Marriott Hotel.

Contra Costa #253. No changes.

Reno Chapter #281. No changes.

San Mateo Chapter #392. Brother George Komis gave San Mateo's report since it was not included in the Convention Agenda. The report is now included with the Chapter reports on page 31 of the Convention Agenda.

Standing Committee Reports (10:35 a.m.)

Scholarship Committee. PSS Andy Banis, Scholarship Chairman, read his report (see page 32 of the Convention Agenda. Brother Banis reported that a financial report will be available Saturday, June 10, 2000. Brother George Johnson commended Brother Banis for a job well done. Brother Harry Kalargiros reported that the Stratigopoulos Family has

submitted a check to the Scholarship Committee, but the check has never cleared their bank. Brother Kalargiros said they will no longer support the Scholarship program. It was suggested by the Delegates that the Scholarship Committee visit Mrs. Stratigopoulos.

Charitable Raffle. A detailed written report by Manager PSG Paul Eliopoulos is included in the Convention Agenda on pages 33-36. A current report submitted after the convention by Brother Eliopoulos is included in the Convention Committee reports, pages 9-17.

Past District Governors Advisors/Directors. PDG Ted Cuclis, Chairman, stated he will report after their meeting. A written report was submitted and is included with the Convention Committee reports on page 23 of the Convention Minutes.

The Center for Hellenic Studies (Ahepa University). PDG Gus Hazifotis reported that Ahepa is getting a lot of mileage out the project with Stanford University who will begin classes on the internet and develop a brochure for fund raising. Metropolitan Anthony has been appointed Honorary Chairman of the Center for Hellenic Studies. Pre-paid legal services is a method to support project. Weekend and summer seminars are being considered. Summer seminars would work since dormitories would be available. Target would be Greek Americans including High School and College teachers. This would also be a way to increase Ahepa embership. See reports on pages 34 and 35 of the Convention Minutes.

District Lodge Officer Reports (11:10 a.m.)

District Warden - Arnold Doer. No changes to report as submitted. See page 48 of the Convention Agenda.

District Secretary - Nick Korakas. No changes to report as submitted. See page 43 of the Convention Agenda.

Convention Chairman Michael Pappas called a recess at 11:40 a.m. so all delegates could attend the Delegates Luncheon. Friday afternoon session will begin at 2 p.m.

BUSINESS SESSION - FRIDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 9, 2000

Afternoon Session called to order by Convention Chairman Michael Pappas at 2:00 p.m.

While waiting for delegates to return from the lunch break District Governor told a joke and District Secretary read a story. Brother Byron Gravalis, Modesto Chapter, asked for input on how to publicize offer of scholarships to potential seminarians. The body suggested that each chapter be notified along with priests in each chapter city. It was agreed that since this is a Chapter project District oversight is not required.

Roll call. First order of business was roll call by Convention Chairman Michael Pappas. Afternoon voting strength was 4 District Lodge Officers, 12 Past District Governors and 18 Chapter Delegates for a total of 34 present.

District Lodge Officer Reports Continued.

District Governor - Bill Booras. (See written report on page 41 of the Convention Agenda). Governor Booras thanked the Chapters that sent their newsletters and meeting notices. Asked that members write their Congressmen concerning the return of the Marbles and discouraging action of Turkey's request for purchasing attack helicopters. Announced approval of Ahepa Sweepstakes Raffle - tickets are \$25 each. Reported on Salute to Veterans Biannual Banquet. Chapter can purchase medals for eligible veterans for \$25 each. Metropolitan Anthony wants to refurbish Ahepa Building at St. Nicholas Ranch at a cost of \$100,000. Suggested that the Convention Banquet should be a testimonial to District Governors and the Luncheon for Scholarship Awards. Governor Booras also reported that the Monterey Chapters of Ahepa and Daughters want to reactivate.

PDG Michael Pappas suggested that volunteers of skilled Ahepans could work week-ends to refurbish the Ahepa Building.

Good of the Order:

Brother Angelo Lygizos announced that PSS Andy Banis is to run for Supreme Vice President. Brother Banis thanked Brother Lygizos. Brother Banis asked that all delegates to the Supreme Convention participate by voting and serving on committees. Last year members running for office and supported by District #21 lost by only four votes. Many of the committees are hand picked. We must as a District vote and serve as a unit.

BUSINESS SESSION - SATURDAY MORNING, JUNE 10, 2000.

Saturday morning Business Session was called to order at 9:20 a.m. by Convention Chairman Michael Pappas.

Convention Chairman Michael Pappas introduced PDG Jim Tsolinas from District #20 and Supreme Governor J. John Rupakis.

Roll call of District Officers, Past District Governors and Delegates. See pages 10-17

Hellenic American Veterans Memorial. Brother Lou Eleopoulos, Chairman of this National Project, describe the project and progress to date. See written report on page 39 of the Convention Agenda and pages 31 and 32 of the Convention Minutes. Total cost of the project will be from \$750,000 to \$800,000. Plan is to raise money similar to that was done for the Ellis Island project, that is, a gift of \$100 for each veteran name submitted. Short term goals are to promote awareness of the project, establish fund-raiser and provide seed money for start-up expenses.

Convention Chairman introduced Supreme Vice President Dr. James Dimitrios.

Committee Reports: (9:50 a.m.)

Sons of Pericles and Athletic Committees - Chairman Tassos Konstantin. Brother Konstantin has nothing to report on the Sons of Pericles. They are still around. They meet when an event is planned and that is about it. Athletic Committee: There were no presentations scheduled for this year. Brother Konstantin asked the Delegates to submit names of candidates to him for consideration for induction into the Ahepa Hall of Fame. A written report was not submitted.

Growth and Expansion. Byron Gravalis reporting. Committee developed three recommendations. 1) Each Chapter should budget and make an annual contribution to the District Scholarship Fund. 2) District Governors appoint a joint committee to meet with Metropolitan Anthony to encourage priests to work closely with Hellenic organizations. 3) Establish a joint Convention Committee to assist Convention Cities with Hotel Accommodations, Banquets, Attendance, Events, Procedures and Committee Selection. See written report on page 20 of the Convention Minutes. Report was approved as stated.

Traveler. Chairman Byron Gravalis. Recommendations include to encourage delegates to the Supreme Convention to promote the *Traveler* to the Publication Committee. Ask members to support the *Traveler* by placing ads. See written report on page 21 of the Convention Minutes. Report was approved as submitted.

Special Projects. Chairman PDG Gus Hazifotis. Under discussion was a letter addressed to District Governor Bill Booras from Metropolitan Anthony requesting \$100,000 to refurbish the Ahepa Building at St. Nicholas Ranch. Committee agrees it is a worthwhile project, however, District is not in a position to underwrite the total cost. A recommendation is that funding for this project, in part, be shared by each Chapter donating one half of their Charitable Raffle refund each year to the project. It is further recommended the Metropolitan contact other Ahepa Districts in the Diocese to request funding for this project. See written report on page 22 of the Convention Minutes. After great deal of discussion concerning this project the report was approved as submitted.

Convention and Conference Cities. Chairman PDG Charles Spyropoulos. Committee reported that the Reno Chapter will not host the 2001 District Convention. The Fall Conference will be hosted by Sacramento. No Chapters stepped forward to host the Spring Conference. See written report on page 19 of Convention Minutes.

Daughters Liaison. Chairman George Komis. The Daughters requested that District #21 jointly submit a resolution to the Supreme Convention that all National publications be combined into one publication covering AHEPA, Daughters of Penelope, Sons and Maids. This would be a cost saving to the Ahepa Family. The Delegates approved the resolution.

At this point (11:00 a.m.) the Delegates rose for a moment of silence to honor our departed brothers.

Supreme Governor J. John Rupakis. Governor Rupakis covered his activities over the past three years as Supreme Governor. He discussed "Ahepa Roundtable 2000" a broad overview of Ahepa. See outline on page 36 of Convention Committee reports. Governor also reviewed Ahepa's "Loss Due To Irregularities" and distributed "Financial Control To Prevent Embezzlement." See pages 37 and 38 of the Convention Committee reports.

Morning session adjourned at 11:40 a.m. Afternoon session to begin at 2:00 p.m. The Fresno Daughters of Penelope hosted a Fashion Show Luncheon. The theme old and new wedding fashions. The event was enjoyed by all who attended. See program on page 43 of the Convention Committee reports.

BUSINESS SESSION - SATURDAY AFTERNOON JUNE 10, 2000.

Afternoon session was called to order at 2:20 p.m. by the Convention Chairman. Committee reports were continued.

Committee Reports Continued:

Scholarship Committee - Chairman PDG Ted Cuclis. The Scholarship Committee submitted six recommendations. 1) First meeting of the District Scholarship Committee should be held before August 1st to elect committee officers. 2) Three categories of scholarship applicants should be considered. 3) Scholarship applications should be made available by October 1st. 4) Change deadline for applicants to submit applications to April 1st. 5) District Conventions must scheduled after June 15th so students are able to attend Awards

Banquet. 6) Consider increasing minimum scholarship award to \$1500. Recommendations were approved by the body. See written report on page 18 of the Convention Committee Reports. PDG Bill Rotas reported that the 501(C)3 was still pending a IRS ruling. Application had to be resubmitted. PSS Andy Banis stated the Chapters in Oakland, San Jose, Fresno, San Francisco and Modesto carry the Scholarship Fund. All the Chapters should participate. Also, the Supreme Lodge awards 35 scholarships each year. There was discussion whether or not Trade School students were eligible for scholarships. There was no definitive answer.

Past District Governors Advisors/Directors - Chairman PDG Ted Cuclis.

Chairman Cuclis reported the committee held elections and PDG Ted Cuclis was elected Chairman. See Convention Committee reports page 23.

Audit and Finance Committee (2:55 p.m.) - Chairman Arnold Doer.

The Audit and Finance Committee made an extensive report covering a range of problems including procedures not being followed and existing accounts which are not being properly supervised. See report on pages 24 and 28 of the Convention Committee reports. The Committee asked the body what to do with a CD with Washington Mutual. It was decided that the account be transferred to the District Account until it is determined whether it belongs to the District General Fund or the District Scholarship Fund. Several recommendations were proposed by the committee and written into their report.

District Lodge Awards (3:20 p.m.) DG Bill Booras reporting.

Supreme Vice President Dr. James Demitriou spoke to the Delegates. SVP Demitriou is Chairman of the Educational Committee and the Cyprus and Hellenic Affairs Committee. He discussed the need for regional conferences. He asked that we support the Ahepa Rose Parade Float, a National Project. He supports the idea of the West Coast hosting the National Convention every five years. Will submit a resolution to do away with the party system in electing Supreme Officers. Is involved in the Olympic Medal design. He backs District #21 projects and last but not least expresses the good wishes from the Supreme President.

Good of the Order

PDG Angelo Mountanos stated on behalf of the Past District Governors that every effort should be made to make the Saturday District Conferences structural with speakers, etc.

Brother Tassos Konstantin expressed his concern about not having a date for the next District Convention. Also, we should contact other District Governors (Districts 19, 20 & 22) about joint conventions. Supreme Governor Rupakis suggested passing a resolution giving him authorization to pursue this matter. A resolution was not made.

Elections of District Lodge Officers

Appointment of Tellers - PDG Bill Rotas and Brother Angelo Lygizos were appointed tellers for the purpose of counting election votes.

The current 1999-2000 District Lodge was reelected without opposition for a second term.

During our committee meetings the following exceptions were found:

1. The Section 1, Paragraph E, Manual of Procedures and Guidelines is not being followed by the District Treasurer "quarterly reports are to be prepared Quarterly and Distributed to District Governor.

2. No Procedure or Guidelines have been established for the District Auditor.

3. Bank Accounts must have signature cards updated. Some accounts have not been changed for as much as 13 years.

4. Bank Statements are not being mailed to the people responsible for reconciling and recording of data.

5. Cut-off records used to reconcile and produce reports are not done at a timely way. It is virtually impossible to do at Convention time and further does not allow for proper audit.

6. A CD for \$11,269 deposited with Washington Mutual Bank has not appeared in District cash Asset Statements for a number of years. John Koplos has been getting Annual statements for renewal and says he has been forwarding to District Auditor, Bill Rotas, however, Brother Rotas can not confirm that, although he indicated that this was money left over after the final payment of the St. Nicholas Ranch Ahepa Lodge. The original amount was approximately \$6,000 and has accumulated interest since 1987. Nick Gianopoulos, Scholarship Committee Treasurer when informed by John Koplos as to the existence of this account, thought this acct belonged to the Scholarship Committee. After some investigation and contact with the Banking institution he learned that the signatures were not of former or current Scholarship members. Those signatory are Paul Eliopoulos, Mike Pappas, and George Konstantopoulos. John Koplos who was receiving the Statements for this account is not shown as a signatory of said account. Nick Gianopoulos spoke to 2 of the signatories, George Konstantopoulos and Paul Eliopoulos, who verified that this was District 21 funds. It is advised by the Audit Committee that someone take responsibility for this account returning it to current District 21 Control. The convention body should make an immediate determination of what purpose these funds may be used. Bill Rotas will prepare the paperwork to close out this account and Transfer the funds to District Control.

7. Statements from World Saving Acct #05-406118-9 are being mailed erroneously to George Johnson. This account was set up to receive donations of \$15,000 from Alex Spanos for distribution to a scholarship in his name. The current balance of this account is now over \$30,000. The Scholarship committee is withdrawing the interest accrued on this account to fund this years Scholarship Awards.

8. An amount of \$2,588.01 including a \$1,000 check from Stratigopoulos Givas and some interest from one of the Savings Accounts, was shown as received on a statement prepared at the end of the last Convention, was not deposited to the Scholarship checking account. Bill Rotas will trace and get replacement checks where possible.

Committee Recommendations:

1. The Scholarship Chairman and Treasurer needs to meet with our District Auditor to go over financial information and to update signature cards and mailing addresses for bank statements.

2. U. S. West Stock originally valued at \$1,076 and is now virtually worthless needs to be liquidated and deposited in the Scholarship current account.

3. The convention body should approve the position of "Financial Secretary" as opposed to "District Auditor" and a committee for "Audit and Finance" composed of 3 members appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Convention Body. This committee would meet with the Financial Secretary on a regular basis. A regular basis is defined as the Fall and Spring Conferences and Convention or 3 times Annually. The duties of the committee will be to examine the books and records for each period. It is further recommended that the "Financial Secretary" be compensated in the amount of \$100 for each reporting period which would be \$300 Annually. Compensation for Travel and Supplies should also allowed. Such payments to be made out of District Funds.

4. The cut-off for financial activity shall be May 1 of each year, so the Audit and Finance committee will have time to reconcile the records for reporting to the convention. This would make the bookkeeping and record keeping run from May 1 the April 30 of each year.

5. Manual of procedures & Guidelines should be updated to include the Position of "Financial Secretary" & "Audit & Finance Committee" with duties & responsibilities spelled out clearly.

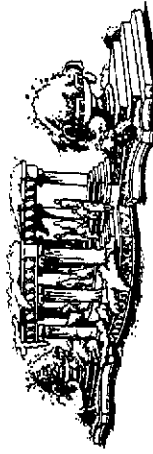
6. The committee should be authorized to consolidate accounts in a investment portfolio fund, identifying donations funding various scholarships named for the original donors. This can be done for all Scholarship Funds.

District savings accounts should be handled in the same manner. The District checking account may remain the same as it is. The Audit & Finance committees shall have oversight for signature cards and mailing changes done in a timely manner.

"BIRTHPLACE OF DEMOCRACY"

The AHEPA's entry in the 2001 Tournament of Roses Parade depicts the Athenian Assembly, the supreme political body of the Assembly Council of Citizens. Ancient Athenians decided issues by a simple majority vote from within a council of 500 citizens all chosen by lot — not status or class. In this manner they conducted their business.

Never has there been a political arena in which citizens participated more fully. As Pericles declares, "We do not say that a man who takes no interest in politics is a man who minds his own business. We say that he has no business here at all." In one of his many, eloquent orations, Pericles foretold, "Future ages will wonder at us now. Our constitution is called a democracy because power is in the hands not of a minority but of the whole people."

Ancient Greece still exerts a peculiar enchantment over our imagination. Even today the Hellenic view of life excites and exalts us, and Hellenic thought is closely woven into the Fabric of America. 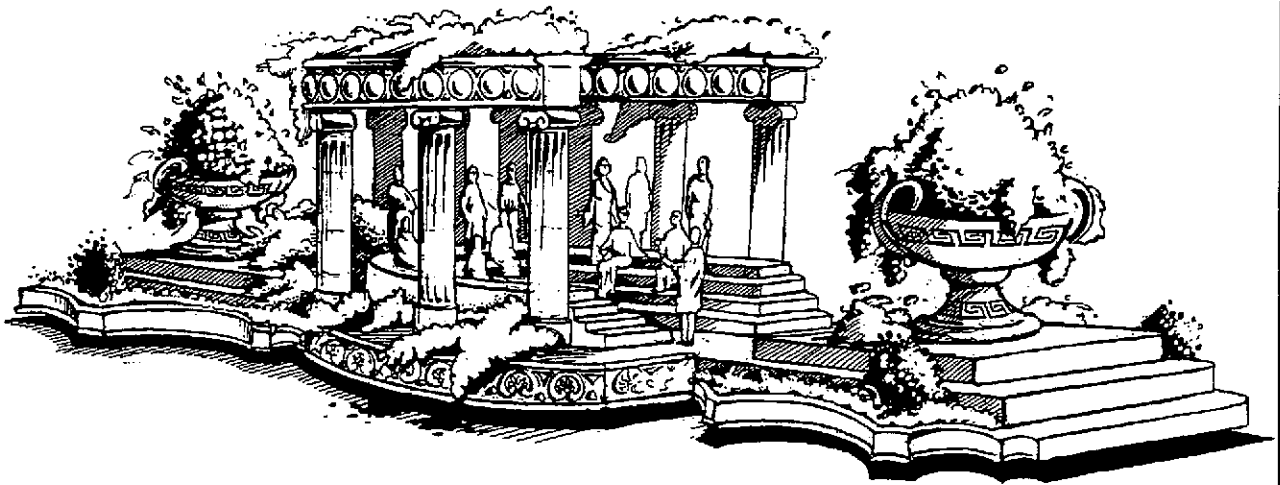

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The *Hellenic Studies on the Internet Committee* has selected **Stanford University**, Palo Alto, CA, to develop the first two (2) courses on Hellenism. We will work towards establishing a long-term agreement with Stanford University. The initial proposal, for the first two courses, is summarized as follows:

Stanford will design and produce the first two online courses by November 2000. The courses are "*Archaeology of the Greek World*" and "*Encountering Homer's Odyssey*"

Encountering Homer's Odyssey-Poetry-Dramatic experience to be heard and seen performed much like a one-person show. The student shall have an understanding of the time, place and attitudes of the time and being totally immersed in that period. The sounds and language as it was sung and performed, the landscape and sites of Homer's world, and the heroes who populated it and the values that governed it come to life. Portions of the Course will be offered in three languages; English, Greek and the Ancient Greek of that time. (*Professor Richard Martin, PhD Harvard*)

Archaeology of the Greek World-Explore how Greece' past has come to be so meaningful to the modern world. Three modules focus on three key archaeological sites (Aegina, Olympia and Knosos) excavated at key times in the development of archaeology as a discipline. The student will be able to pick the areas of interest (history, archaeology methods, restoration) and depth of content using multiple sensory dimensions. A truly a unique self-paced learning experience. (*Professor Michael Shanks, PhD Cambridge*)

Stanford will offer the courses for members of AHEPA free of charge. AHEPA will charge its members and the Hellenic Community a reasonable fee to help offset the cost of the courses and the development of future courses. The long-term financial commitment to establish the *AHEPA Center for Hellenic Studies*, to provide Hellenic Studies in perpetuity is \$3.5 to \$5 million dollars. This is dependent upon the level of educational effort we desire.

Stanford shall name the *AHEPA Center for Hellenic Studies* as a Partner in the development of the courses. AHEPA shall advertise the courses and link to the Stanford University web page for course registration. Stanford shall also provide a link to the AHEPA web page for anyone desiring information on AHEPA. Stanford's Continuing Studies Program, shall also write an article for its quarterly Catalogue, to promote the courses and discuss AHEPA. Stanford will list AHEPA in its Continuing Studies web site.

Stanford has created an Alliance with Princeton, Yale and Oxford for the purpose of collaboration on distance learning. Our courses shall be made available to those Universities. Stanford is hoping to develop courses on Hellenism, utilizing the best talent from all participating universities. Discussions with Harvard and the University of Chicago are also underway.

FINANCIAL CONTROL TO PREVENT EMBEZZLEMENT

As AHEPA moves forward into the new millennium it will build upon almost 80 years of accomplishments. Having survived a financial loss experienced several years ago, AHEPA is determined to safeguard its assets. AHEPA has established procedures and controls not only to deter but to prevent any future loss of financial assets. Could it happen again? Not likely and here are some of the reasons why...

Internal Control 'Checks and Balances'

AHEPA Headquarter's staff has been organized for segregation of controls in establishing AHEPA's accounting procedures and to safeguard its assets. These procedures are constructed so that no section of the accounting system is under the sole control of one person. Also, the work of each staff employee is related and is reconciled with the work of another. The purpose of such controls is to prevent error and fraud.

1. *Handling of receipts (input)*

The most elaborate control is now provided for the handling of receipts. The duties of the staff charged with receipt of payments from the duties of those who keep the accounting records are segregated. When receipts are received in the mail, a separate staff employee opens the mail and makes a copy of all receipts in duplicate. One copy accompanies the receipt to accounting for deposit; the other serves as the underlying document for membership, sales of supplies, rents or investment income entry. These records are reconciled monthly.

2. *Disbursements (output)*

Checks are signed by one or two responsible AHEPA officers, depending on the amount of the check in accordance with the Constitution. Prior to signing the check, these officers review the disbursement backup for compliance with budget restrictions and monetary availability. Checking accounts, monthly reconciliations and budget expense allocations are handled separately by Headquarters' staff. In summary, no one person is permitted to issue, write, sign and mail disbursements.

4. *Insurance*

New insurance coverage has been arranged at four million dollars to further insure and protect the AHEPA against internal embezzlement.

Strengthened Board of Directors and Supreme Lodge Oversight

Compiled financial statements, including actual costs compared against budget amounts as well as financial highlights, are presented on a regular basis to the Chairman of the Finance Committee as well as to the Board of Directors at their regular meetings. The Supreme Treasurer reviews disbursements and check registers monthly. The Board of Auditors reviews annual audited Financial Statements with outside auditors for compliance with reporting and accounting standards and internal control procedures. Financial oversight is entrusted to capable elected AHEPA officers, providing yet another check on protection against fraud.

Could fraud happen again? With the procedures and controls now in place as described, it would be highly unlikely, if not nearly impossible.

The assets of the AHEPA and its foundations are safe and in good hands.

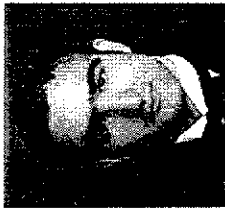
3. *Investments*

Custodianship of AHEPA investment accounts is assigned to various AHEPA officers jointly. The largest loss that occurred during the embezzlement was taken from National Trust Fund investments. To prevent the recurrence, the following procedures are now in place:

- The Investment Committee Chairman approves the transactions made each month by the broker/investment advisor and he makes sure that these transactions comply with the National Trust Fund agreement.
- The Controller is responsible for recording monthly transactions and broker account reconciliation. These numbers are reconciled monthly to make sure that the balances are accounted for.
- The only withdrawals that are permitted are interest and dividends derived from AHEPA investments. The Chairman of the Finance Committee has the responsibility to maintain the income flow from month to month in compliance with the budget. No other withdrawals can be made from the corpus of the National Trust Fund and the Educational Foundation funds, including their trusts and endowments.

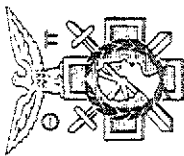
Valorie Ann Atsalis

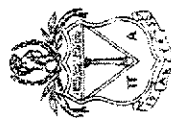
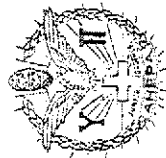

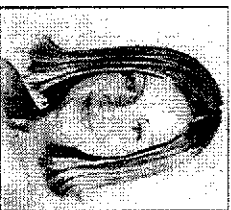
Demetra Mantis *Oakland, California*

AHEPA Center for Hellenic Studies

The *Hellenic Studies on the Internet Committee* has selected Stanford University, Palo Alto, CA, to develop the first two (2) courses on Hellenism. We will work towards establishing a long-term agreement with Stanford University. The initial proposal, for the first two courses, is summarized as follows:

Stanford will design and produce the first two online courses by November 2000. The courses are "*Archaeology of the Greek World*" and "*Encountering Homer's Odyssey*"

Encountering Homer's Odyssey-Poetry-Dramatic experience to be heard and seen performed much like a one-person show. The student shall have an understanding of the time, place and attitudes of the time and being totally immersed in that period. The sounds and language as it was sung and performed, the landscape and sites of Homer's world, and the heroes who populated it and the values that governed it come to life. Portions of the Course will be offered in three languages; English, Greek and the Ancient Greek of that time. (*Professor Richard Martin, PhD Harvard*)

Archaeology of the Greek World-Explore how Greece' past has come to be so meaningful to the modern world. Three modules focus on three key archaeological sites (Aegina, Olympia and Knosos) excavated at key times in the development of archaeology as a discipline. The student will be able to pick the areas of interest (history, archaeology methods, restoration) and depth of content using multiple sensory dimensions. A truly a unique self-paced learning experience. (*Professor Michael Shanks, PhD Cambridge*)

Stanford will offer the courses for members of AHEPA free of charge. AHEPA will charge its members and the Hellenic Community a reasonable fee to help offset the cost of the courses and the development of future courses. The long-term financial commitment to establish the *AHEPA Center for Hellenic Studies*, to provide Hellenic Studies in perpetuity is \$3.5 to \$5 million dollars. This is dependent upon the level of educational effort we desire.

Stanford shall name the *AHEPA Center for Hellenic Studies* as a Partner in the development of the courses. AHEPA shall advertise the courses and link to the Stanford University web page for course registration. Stanford shall also provide a link to the AHEPA web page for anyone desiring information on AHEPA. Stanford's Continuing Studies Program, shall also write an article for its quarterly Catalogue, to promote the courses and discuss AHEPA. Stanford will list AHEPA in its Continuing Studies web site.

Stanford has created an Alliance with Princeton and Yale for the purpose of collaboration on distance learning. Our courses shall be made available to those Universities. Stanford is hoping to develop courses on Hellenism, utilizing the best talent from all participating universities. Discussions with Harvard and the University of Chicago are also underway.

The Center for Hellenic Studies on the Internet also referred to as AHEPA University is an approved AHEPA National Project (San Diego, National Convention, July 1999). Contributions may be tax deductible. Consult your tax advisor.
